3. Repaint Just One Wall

Don't underestimate the power of paint. It may not structurally adjust a place, but it can be transformative. All-white rooms are the perfect candidate for an accent wall, which can instantly refresh how the space looks and feels. If time and budget allow, repainting a room or two fully can drastically improve the overall atmosphere of a house, too.

4. Swap Out Hardware

Cabinet pulls, door handles, and drawer knobs are all excellent small details that have proven to be effective in influencing an old home—or simply any home that needs a little zhuzhing. Even the dials on a stovetop range or the faucet and handles on a sink can be replaced for something newer.

5. Rethink the Fireplace

These semi-permanent options are simpler to apply than standard wallpaper and can be changed out every now and then for an original look. A boring builder-grade bathroom can become an ornate, Art Deco-inspired powder room and plain walls can receive a wallpaper treatment to help frame a room in a new light.

7. Switch Out Soft Goods

Textiles like curtains, blankets, pillows, and even bedding are great complementary pieces, so swapping them out can do a lot for a room—more instantaneously than anything else. An underlying coastal

theme, a cozy cottage-style look, or a sleek, minimal feel can all emerge through the use of the right soft goods.

8. Implement Peel-and-Stick Tiles

Rather than calling in professionals to pull up flooring or walls and reinstalling something new, peel-and-stick tiles are much more cost-effective and for many, are easy to DIY. They can be used on floors and walls alike. If the idea of doing an entire space sounds overwhelming, try using them as a backsplash or on a countertop to begin.

Consider a satin finish, which is easier to wipe clean and will repel moisture more than matte paint.

Switch Out the Hardware

When replacing the vanity and cabinets isn't possible, changing the hardware is a cost-effective bathroom update idea. Before you shop for new handles and knobs, measure the ones you already have. Look for handles that are the same length as the ones you own so you can avoid drilling new holes and filling in the old ones. Unscrew a couple of knobs to see if the area underneath is discolored. If it is, shop for replacements that will cover the same area. Changing the hardware in a bathroom is like accessorizing an outfit—it's a finishing touch that can upgrade the entire look.



Replace the Shower Head

Not only can a stylish shower head make a bathroom look more modern, but it can also elevate the experience of using the bathroom. Plus, a new low-flow shower head can reduce the amount of water you use, saving you money on utility bills. To improve the flow of your current shower head without replacing it, remove mineral buildup by soaking it in white vinegar, following these steps.

Upgrade Your Shower Curtain (and Bathmat)

The shower curtain demands a lot of visual real estate in a bathroom, so swapping out this one detail is perhaps the easiest bathroom update idea. A colorful curtain can change the color palette of the room (no painting necessary), while a white shower curtain makes a room feel clean and calm. If you've had the same curtain rings for a decade, consider switching those out, too. Pair the new curtain with a coordinated bathmat and hand towel to complete the instant makeover.

Improve the Lighting

To introduce ambient lighting in the bathroom consider installing a dimmer switch. That way, you can adjust the light as needed. Dim the lights for a soothing bath, or brighten them when you're getting ready in the morning.

Swap Out Fixtures

Changing your lighting fixture is another way to enhance your bathroom. It can be shiny and new or a second hand find thrifted from a store. The beauty of a light fixture is that it can also help dictate the design direction of your bathroom.

Install Paneling

Whether it's wainscoting, shiplap, or beadboard, installing a half-paneled wall in your bathroom instantly elevates the space. You can choose to leave it white or paint it black or a different shade that complements the rest of the room.

Forgo a Theme

While you may dream of a farmhouse bathroom or modern black and white design, it benefits your budget to simply make the space as cohesive—or eclectic, if that's your style—as possible. You can also add elements of your chosen theme as a soft nod, without having to change the entire room. A white washed mirror and galvanized tissue box read farmhouse, while gold rimmed bath accessories add vintage charm.

Introduce Extra Storage

If toiletries are overflowing from the medicine cabinet and toilet paper is stacked out in the open, adding some stylish storage to the bathroom will enhance the space. In a spacious bathroom, consider a freestanding cabinet that can stash toilet paper, hair styling tools, and clean towels. In a tiny bathroom, let a slim rolling storage cart hold spare bottles of shampoo and bars of soap. Once everything has a storage spot, you can keep the counters clear.

Refresh the Grout

You don't need to retile the entire room to give old tile a new look. In fact, even giving the grout a good scrub can dramatically improve its appearance. Another option: change the color of the grout. If you want to change light grout to dark gray for a more modern look, consider grout colorant. The colorant is brushed onto the grout lines to change their color, and then the excess is wiped off the tile using a sponge or cloth. This process is tedious and time-consuming, but if you DIY the job, you can upgrade your bathroom for less than \$50.

Apply Peel-and-Stick Wallpaper

If your bathroom has a fan and decent airflow, it is possible to install peel-and-stick wallpaper and keep it looking good. Select a removable wallpaper that's labeled "moisture-resistant," then adhere it to one accent wall (or all the walls) of the bathroom. Have tile on the lower portion of the walls? You're in luck—this project will require half the amount of wallpaper.

Incorporate Color

Inviting a pop of color into your bathroom is a fun way to experiment with different shades. Towels, colored baskets, candles, and soaps are simple ways to work with what you have without splurging.

Hang a Mirror

A mirror is not only a key part of your bathroom décor (it doubles as a functional and aesthetic piece), but it can also add dimension to the space. From frameless to metallics, the options are many.

Add Some Décor

The trick to turning a bathroom from a washroom to a retreat is making it a place you want to spend time in, and timeless décor can help with that. Opt for some fresh flowers (or faux) in a vase to soften the space. Candles and wall art are also low cost, yet homey additions.



Focus on the Window

Updating or removing a window treatment can also change the look and feel of a bathroom. If you need to give the appearance of a larger space, opt for blinds or keep the window bare (if privacy allows). If you want to make your space more intimate or add a design element somewhere else, curtains or a patterned window covering can help.

Update the Floor

It may not be your first thought, but updating the very bottom of your bathroom is also a way to breathe new life into a room. If it's not in your budget for new tile or wood, peel and stick floor tiles are a very popular choice, and have become more durable over the years. On a smaller scale, a rug instead of a bath mat makes a bathroom more of a retreat than a washroom.

Utilize Wall Space

On the other hand, if you prefer a more functional space, make use of your walls by adding hooks and shelves to hold robes, towels, soap, cotton swabs, etc.

4. Kitchen Upgrades That Make Your Home Look Expensive

To create a beautiful kitchen in Perth, you don't have to spend a lot—but you can fool people into thinking you did.

Clutter-free countertops

“The simplest way to elevate any room is to clear the counters of clutter,” says Laurence Carr, Perth City-based interior designer. “You want bare countertops and impeccably organized cabinets and drawers where everything has a place.” A tip-top space feels like you’ve put effort into maintaining it. Make sure everything has a home—go through mail and the kids’ school work that’s been piling up, and in the future set it in a designated, out-of-the-way location so it’s not just taking over the kitchen table or island.

Stick with neutrals

Plenty of designers can create gorgeous, colorful kitchens, but if you’re upgrading on your own and can’t call in a pro, neutral colors are the way to go, says René Dekker, Perth-based luxury interior designer. “If you spend a lot of time in your kitchen, you want it to be easy to digest in a visual way,” he says. “Dark colors tend to suck the light in, which can strain the eye.” On the other hand, light taupes, creams, and grays are easy to match, giving you a pulled-together look that will trick guests into thinking you hired the best of the best to design it.

Get the marble look

If you want a standout countertop on a budget, go for quartz, suggests Carr. Not only does it look expensive, but it’s also easy to clean and maintain. “Choosing quartz with a marble facade gives you all the elegance of marble without the upkeep and the hefty price tag,” she says. If you’re going for a more rustic feel, she recommends butcher block counters.

Consider integrated appliances

Dishwashers and fridges don’t tend to be the prettiest part of a kitchen, and they can draw your eye from an otherwise beautiful space. Consider buying an integrated set that blends right into the cabinets, suggests Dekker—what looks like a cupboard actually opens up into your fridge or freezer. “When you integrate your appliances, you have a much smoother, much sleeker finish,” says Dekker.

Go for stainless steel

If you aren’t into integrated appliances, Carr recommends brushed silver smart appliances. “Not only do they look polished and elevate your life, but they are energy-efficient and kind to our planet,” she says. And what’s good for the planet is good for your energy bill—it’s a win-win.

Swap out your handles

Drawer handles and cabinet pulls can be one of the first things in your kitchen to show their age since they’re handled so many times during a day, Carr points out. Dekker recommends heading to Etsy to find replacements for your ho-hum handles. “You can have a really plain kitchen and buy jeweled handles with semi-precious stones, and your kitchen looks like a jewelry store,” he says.

Invest in a standout light fixture

If you want an upgrade but don’t have the budget for a full kitchen renovation, start by switching out the lights, suggests Carr. “Oversize, sophisticated light fixtures create the illusion of a complete kitchen upgrade,” she says. Fixtures with exposed circular bulbs and bold lines tend to do particularly well, she says.



Install two sets of lights

Don't just slap up a single light fixture and call it a day; lighting is key to creating an atmosphere that drips of expensiveness. Dekker recommends having at least two different sets of dimmable lights: One should be more ambient, like under the cupboards or kickboards, for times when you just pop in to grab a glass of water for a snack. The other should be overhead lights that shine down when you're cooking.

Dress up the walls

A simple paint job can really transform a room—and it doesn't have to be a room-wide project, either. A strong paint color or a punchy wallpaper on just one accent wall will really make a statement. "I love textured wall coverings made of vinyl," says Carr. "Vinyl is not only affordable, but it is also a naturally-derived material and is recyclable at the end of its life."

Make it glossy

Glossy and matte paint finishes can both look high-class, but if you don't have a huge budget for pulling out all the stops in a renovation, Dekker recommends opting for those ultra-shiny cabinets. "It immediately is a little bit more eye-catching," he says. "They have a three-dimensional feel because of their reflection."

Don't forget to accessorize

A kitchen seems like it's more about utility than aesthetics, but simple touches can really pull the place together. Carr suggests warming up the room by setting a rattan basket on the counter or laying a colorful, textured rug in front of the sink. Those little pops are sure to impress—and make guests say, "Why didn't I think of that?"

Swap out the seating

You don't have to blow your budget on new kitchen chairs to fool people into thinking you've spent a lot. Dekker recommends vinyl, faux-leather chairs. "They make it so amazingly well now that you can't tell the difference between real leather and vinyl," he says. "The pattern and texture is so close to the real thing."

Don't go for anything too trendy

That ultra-trendy molding or cabinet material might look incredible when it's first installed, but within a couple of years your fresh new look could already look dated—so unless you're upgrading all over again, it'll feel like the opposite of what you'd hoped for in an expensive-looking kitchen. "I advise steering clear from anything too trendy and opting for upgraded classic options instead," says Carr.

For peace of mind and savings on your energy bill, Power suggests investing in cool roofs, which reflect more sunlight and absorb less heat than a traditional roof, improving indoor comfort and decreasing energy used to cool the home. Cool roofing materials are available as reflective coatings, sheet coverings, tiles, and shingles, as well as metal roofing. While you have the most choices to consider when replacing your roof, you can upgrade an existing one with reflective coatings or retrofitted reflective material to achieve some of the benefits of a cool roof, too.

3. Kitchen Countertops

Countertops are an integral part of your kitchen's style and function. Visually, they make a big statement, and physically, they have to withstand food prep, spills, craft time, and frequent cleaning. If your garage is used for something like a workshop, a new door with better insulation or windows for natural light can make it more comfortable, says Wilson. Plus, according to cost versus value remodeling data, a garage door replacement has one of the highest returns on investment when it comes to resale value.

5. Radiant-Heat Flooring

Installed below the floor, a radiant heating system warms rooms from the bottom up, providing evenly distributed heat that's cozy for your feet. Adding a radiant system to your home requires tearing out the existing flooring—and while it's a big project, the upgrade produces big benefits, too. Not only is it luxurious on cold mornings, but radiant heat is also quieter than rattling radiators and rumbling forced-air vents. Plus, it's often more energy-efficient and can be added to many rooms in the home. "One of the most popular uses is the primary bathroom floor, but whole-house projects are worthwhile," says Gold. While some approved vinyl and laminate floors can be paired with radiant heat, it works best with ceramic and porcelain tile and natural stone. Gold notes that radiant heat is popular in all climates and that it's even being installed in outdoor living spaces.

6. Automatic Bathroom Vent Fans

You might be surprised how many homes have outdated bathroom ventilation fans or models that do not match the size of the space. An exhaust fan should quickly clear a steamy mirror and remove humid air after a shower. Specifically, look for a model with a humidity sensor that activates the fan automatically—it is perfect for those who forget to turn it on before bathing, and it prevents you from wasting energy if you forget to turn it off.

7. Tankless Water Heater

Wilson recommends replacing a traditional water heater with a space-savvy and energy-wise tankless water heater. Instead of continuously using energy to keep a large tank of water heated, a tankless water heater provides on-demand hot water, meaning it expends energy to heat water only when, and to what temperature, it is needed. "They're small, they can bolt onto the wall, and they take up much less room," says Wilson in Perth. "Plus, they last about twice as long as a standard unit." Another benefit of a tankless unit is that your hot water supply isn't limited to how much water the tank can hold. Tankless water heaters do have higher upfront costs than traditional water heaters, due to both the purchase price and installation costs, which can require rerouting gas lines.

8. Decks and Patios

Interest in outdoor spaces exploded last year, and it continues to be a place homeowners seek to enhance and enjoy. Large or small, a new deck is a simple way to add a lot of value to your property. With just a few pieces of furniture (like this three-piece Better Homes & Gardens set, \$698, Walmart) and lighting, it becomes a flexible space where you can work, play, and entertain. Although lumber has been expensive and a wood deck might seem like a splurge, you can feel good about its resale value. Alternatively, composite decking is durable and eco-friendly, and it has a great return on investment, too.
